An Analysis of the Big Five Personality (OCEAN) on The Characters in Garth Jennings's Movie *Sing*

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Abstract: The big five personalities, such as conscientiousness, agreeableness, neuroticism, openness to experience, and extraversion, displayed by each character in the movie *Sing*. It provides insight into how to achieve goals and dreams despite numerous challenges in life, which makes it interesting to investigate. This objective of this research is to investigate the Big Five Personality of the characters in the movie *Sing*. This study takes a mixed-methods approach, combining descriptive qualitative analysis and content analysis, where scenes and speech from the movie were analyzed to discover and categorize the characters' personality qualities. The research findings on the Big Five personality traits in the movie *Sing* stated that extraversion reaches at 12.5%, while neuroticism, agreeableness and openness to experience each getting at 18.75%, and conscientiousness at 31.25%. The analysis of the Big Five Personality types in the movie finds a variety of characters embodying distinct features. Buster Moon exemplifies Extraversion, reaching at 12.5% of the attributes and showing a moderate level of friendliness and outgoing personality. Meena and Buster Moon both exhibit Neuroticism, reaching at 18.75% of their characters and emphasizing emotional depth and sensitivity. Rosita and Buster Moon embody Agreeableness to the same percentage as Neuroticism and openness to experience, stressing compassion and empathy throughout their interactions. Johny, Meena, and Buster Moon stand out in Conscientiousness, getting at 31.25% and demonstrating organizational and dependability. Johny and Buster Moon also have an Openness to Experience of 18.75%, indicating a willingness to explore new ideas and engage in creative efforts. Overall, this extensive analysis provides valuable insight into the diverse personalities shown in the movie *Sing*, expanding our understanding of how the Big Five Personality impact the characters' behaviors and interactions in the movie.

INTRODUCTION

According to Franz Kafka (1920), origins of literature can be traced back to artistic movements like expressionism and surrealism, as well as works of fiction. Literature can serve multiple purposes, such as improving language skills, motivating learners, and increasing multicultural awareness, (Mardiani & Baharuddin 2023). It has the remarkable ability to evoke a wide range of emotions, from joy and laughter to fear and sorrow, making it a powerful medium for connecting with others on a deeply human level. Literature offers not just entertainment, but also valuable insights into the human condition, fostering a deeper sense of empathy for others. It's a nice way to connect with other people from different times and places to share our thoughts and ideas. It also has the power to inspire

This one of literature forms, contains, story, culture, history, incidents, play, etc. With images and music, movies can tell a lot in a short time, Sholihah (2021). This one of literature forms, contains, story, culture, history, incidents, play, etc. It is recorded as video and shown in television, cinema, theater, or other broadcast media. The purpose is to entertain, teach, or even inspire people. Movie has different types, and each types offer story and unique experience. One of the most important parts in movie is characters. The characters make us connected to their journey, happiness, tears, and it even makes people care what happens to them. Character is more than just about good or bad, but it's a choice which can decide someone's failure or success. qualities, behavior, and mental processes, (Nandita, 2022). Big Five Personality is a personality theory developed by McCrae and Costa and often used in character creation and development. It consists of extraversion, openness to experience, conscientiousness, agreeableness, and neuroticism. Personality traits are not fixed and unchanging; they possess the potential to evolve and develop over time. Through various life experiences, encountering challenges, and gaining knowledge, individuals can transform their personality. These changes impact perception of the world, interactions with others, and overall navigation through life. Personality is closely connected to identity, influencing individuality and shaping decision-making and behavior. Witnessing the dynamic nature of personality and its profound influence on life is undeniably captivating.

This research discusses about the big five personality on the characters of movie *Sing* by using the personality theory that is developed by McCrae and Costa (1997). *Sing* is an animated animal movie by Garth Jennings. This Garth Jennings's movie is talking about a dapper koala with a heart full of ambition named Buster Moon, have a singing competition for variety of contestants, each with their unique story and talents. This interesting movie combines music, comedy, and heartfelt storytelling that entertain and create an enjoyable experience for audience all ages. McCrae and Costa (1997) Divides this theory into five personalities (OCEAN), Buster has one of the big five personality, that is conscientiousness. He takes his responsibilities seriously, being competent and striving in achieve goals. An example of primarily data of this study :

Eddie: "Dream big dreams?"

Buster: "I know, it's good, right?"

Eddie: "What about the 100 grand?"

Buster: "There's only way to go.

And that's, up!"

In this dialogue, Buster faced significant challenge because of the price money advertisement typographical error. Instead of giving up for the singing competition, he decided to take responsibility to what had happened. Buster embraces the situation with a sense of conscientiousness by showing a strong commitment to his responsibility and trying to find a solution. When Buster tells Eddie that "there's only one way left to go, and that's up," he not only encouraged him but also demonstrated his conscientious nature. Buster demonstrated

his optimistic approach and desire to overcome challenges by concentrating on the positive prospects and opportunity for improvement. Buster's statement also reflects his resilience and refusal to let setbacks define him or the event. Buster believes that even in challenging times, there are opportunities for growth and success. Overall, despite the first setback caused by the typographical error, Buster's conscientious personality shines through as Buster remains determined to turn the situation around and ensure the competition's success.

The previous studies that connected to the topic are (1). Akhtar et al. (2019),²⁸ *"Indonesian Adaptation and Psychometric Properties Evaluation of the Big Five Personality Inventory"*, (2). Roizen et al., (2020),⁷ *"Big Five Personality Traits and Gratitude: The Role of Emotional Intelligence"*, (3). Marta (2021),⁹ *"Overeducation and wages: the Role of Cognitive Skills and Personality Traits"*, (4). Bahri et al. (2022),⁵ *"An Analysis of Big Five Personality (OCEAN) in Linda Woolverton's Movie Alice in Wonderland"*, (5). Duan et al. (2023),³² *"Job Performance in Digital Work: Do Personality Traits Matter?"*.

The differences between this research and the previous study are the focus and the context of the studies. Almost all of the previous research focus on the correlations and consequences of personality traits such as the Big Five, emotional intelligence, and cognitive skills, as well as their impact on adaptation, gratitude, overeducation, pay, and work performance in diverse circumstances. Similar to the fourth article,⁵ *"An Analysis of Big Five Personality (OCEAN) in Linda Woolverton's Movie Alice in Wonderland"* "this research focuses analyzing the big five personality in a particular film. This research analyzing the big five personality in the Garth Jennings's movie, *Sing* by identifying, categorizing and examining the *Sing* movie's monologues and dialogues.

LITERATURE REVIEW

According to McAdams (2005: 15), personality is a unique variation on the general design of human nature. From the definition, it can be seen that someone personality develops throughout someone's life. Each individual has a unique and special personality that is shaped by a combination of traits influencing their emotions and thoughts. Personalities tend to evolve and transform as the progress through life. Personality is not static, but instead undergoes development and changes as acquiring knowledge, mature, and encounter new experiences. Personality also holds great significance in every religion, as it is seen as a means for

individuals to grow spiritually, develop strong moral values, and contribute positively to society. According to McCrae and Costa (1997), about big five personality, as follows:

17 1. Openness to experience

Openness to experience is a type of trait that demonstrates curiosity, creativity, and new ideas. People who have this personality trait are interested in exploring new things and have a strong desire to understand and learn. According to Ayob et al., (2022), some positive qualities of these individuals are open-mindedness, curiosity, creative and intelligent. They have a natural inclination to seek out new experiences and expand their knowledge. For example:

Sea Royi: "I'm sorry. I know you want to help. I sounded arrogant, didn't I?"

Soo Ah: "No. You know a lot of things about sales, where did you learn all that?"

Sea Royi: **"I've been dreaming of opening my own pub for seven years. I did some research and studied a few things. And I constantly read Chairman Jang's autobiography. The book made me realize how incredible he is. It helped me out a lot."**

Soo ah: "I see"

In the drama "Itaewon Class," Saeroyi is portrayed as a determined character with a strong desire to open his own pub. In this dialogue, Soo Ah wondered where did Sae Royi learn about a lot things about sales. Sae Royi's says **"I've been dreaming of opening my pub for seven years. I did some research and studied a few things. And I constantly read Chairman Jang's autobiography. The book made me realize how incredible he is. It helped me out a lot,"** represents his openness to experience personality traits such as creativity, curiosity, respect for knowledge, adaptability, and a proactive approach toward achieving his dreams and broadening his horizons through ongoing learning and discovery. Overall, throughout the drama, Saeroyi's determination and openness to new opportunities drive the narrative and shape his character development.

2. Conscientiousness

Conscientiousness refers to being responsible and diligent in both proactive and inhibitive ways. It involves being competent and striving to achieve goals, being meticulous and careful in one's actions, and being cautious in decision-making. Conscientious people are

organized, reliable, and take their responsibilities seriously. They have a strong work ethic and pay attention to detail to ensure tasks are completed effectively. For example:

Yi Chan: **"Let's get someone then, let's do it! I'll recruit an awesome guitarist."**

Hyun Yul: "Are you that dump? We don't have time to recruit a guitarist and practice with him. We'll need someone like Yoon Dong Jon to make this work."

Yi Chan: "Yoon Dong Jin? Who is that?"

Hyun Yul: "Do you even know who Yoon Dong Jin is?"

In this scene from "Twinkling Watermelon," K-drama, Yi Chan is determined to find a talented guitarist to enhance their band's performance and convince his band members. Demonstrating his conscientiousness, Hyun Yul takes a practical approach, questioning the feasibility of recruiting and rehearsing with a new guitarist within their limited time. Hyun Yul suggests considering someone like Yoon Dong Jin, who already possesses experience and skill. Curious and conscientious, Yi Chan expresses a desire to learn more about the guitarist, Yoon Dong Jin.

3. Extraversion

Sims, (2017) stated that some characteristics of extraversion is friendly, talkative, assertive, and exhibiting lots of emotions. Extraversion is a personality when someone likes being around other people and gets a lot of energy from being in social situations. They are often very outgoing, have a lot of energy, and like talk a lot. They feel really happy and excited when they are with others. For example:

Hee Do: **"I want all of us to do well together. I assure you**

I will never train at night alone."

Senior: "Fine Hee Do, I got your message, so..."

Hee Do: "I would like to train at night with everyone. I'm begging you.

Please join us!"

Senior: "Hey, you can go ahead. Just go ahead and train at night.

Hee Do: "No way. I need your guidance. Please join us."

In this scene, Hee Do shows his extraverted personality by demonstrating a strong desire for social interaction and working together with others. He actively seeks the company of others and asks his senior to join him in training, highlighting his preference for being around people. Hee Do also recognizes the importance of learning from others and seeks guidance from his senior. By saying **"I want all of us to do well together. I assure you I will never train at night alone"**, Hee Do's behavior in this scene reflects his extraversion personality, outgoing nature, and his enthusiasm for social engagement and collaboration. Extraversion is a personality trait characterized by being outgoing, social, and energetic when interacting with others.

4. Agreeableness

Agreeableness is a personality when someone is nice and friendly to other people. They always help and work together with people. People who are agreeable are usually polite, kind, and easy to get along. The personality trait that had the strongest positive relationship with gratitude was agreeableness, Małgorzata Szcześniak, et.al., (2020). Agreeableness refers to how someone interacts with others, it includes traits like trust, honesty, and kindness. For example:

Jeong Woo: "Let's go Ha Neul"

Journalist: "Mr.Yoo!"

Jeong Woo: "Why did you come here?"

Ha Neul: **"To help you, of course. I told you I liked reading minor dissertations too.I looked up your case and remembered reading about a similar one. That's why I hurried over with it. But I wish I found it quicker."**

In this "Doctor Slump" K-drama scene, Jeong Woo ask Ha Neul to go to another quiet place to avoid journalist after his trial for malpractice. 5. Neuroticism

According to Costa & McCrae, (1985), this personality refers to someone who feels bad feelings like sadness and sensitivity. Neuroticism is the tendency to feel negative emotions, anxiety, and psychological distress when faced with threats, frustration, or stress and it has a negative impact on gratitude, (Szczęśniak, et.al., 2020). For example:

Ji-hyung: “Hey, Seo-jun. We can't seem to get that part right.

Maybe try it again?”

Seo-jun: “(sighs) Ugh, I don't know what's wrong. I keep messing up.”

Soo-ho: “Don't worry about it, man. We'll get it eventually.”

Seo-jun: (snaps) **“It's not that easy! I feel like I'm always the one who**

holds you guys back. Maybe I'm just not good enough for this band”

Seo-jun struggles with his part in a new song at the band rehearsal and he feels as if he is holding the group down. Despite his friend's encouragement, he displays dissatisfaction and self-doubt, emphasizing the difficulties of creative collaboration and personal fears in such situations. His exclamation, **“It's not that easy! I feel like I'm always the one who holds you guys back. Maybe I'm just not good enough for this band,”** exemplifies his emotional instability and inability to regulate his reactions. Seo-jun's conversation displays a neurotic personality defined by emotional instability, negative feelings, and self-doubt. The negative feelings he exhibits, combined with a focus on his perceived flaws and the perception that he is inhibiting the group's progress, underline his inclination toward self-criticism and pessimism.

The study applies the big personality (OCEAN) theories by McCrae and Costa (1997) to understand the characters' characteristics. To investigate the characters in the movie *Sing*, this study employs a mixed-methods approach that includes both descriptive qualitative and content analysis methodology. Descriptive qualitative involves conducting a detailed investigation of the characters' behaviors, interactions, and feelings without quantifying the results that will provide comprehensive descriptions and insights into the individuals shown in the video. According to Moleong (2010), qualitative research aims to comprehend the phenomenon of what the subject of study experiences, such as behavior, perceptions,

motivations, actions, and so on. The content analysis is gathering data by watching the film and identifying, categorizing, and analyzing the characteristics of the characters through their monologues and dialogue. In addition to analyzing the movie content, a comprehensive literature review is conducted, selecting relevant articles and journals to enhance the understanding of the characters' personalities and also to strengthen the study's arguments. Overall, the combination of techniques improves the research results' trustworthiness and dependability, providing significant insights for readers looking for a better comprehension of the people and personalities depicted in the movie.

Every character in a movie has different personality, exceptionally in the animated comedy adventure movie *Sing*. 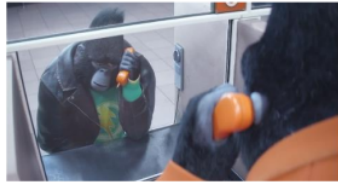

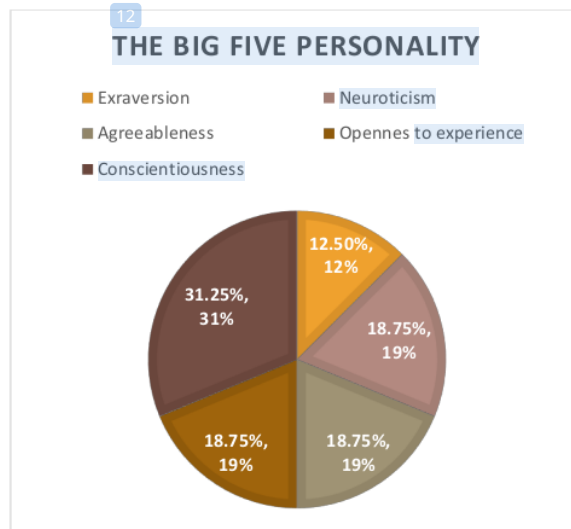
